

I don't know what it was, but I had this strange sense that it was going to be a year for the ages. Of course, it will go down in my history as one of the most strange and difficult years, but I will be honest it was not what I was expecting or hoping for. Most everything about 2020 has pushed each of us to reevaluate our priorities and stare directly into those things that matter most.

As it appeared 2020 was unraveling before our eyes. As we were adding new language like social distancing and mask up I came across this poem written by Leslie Dwight. As the reality of a global pandemic was unraveling before us I remember thinking wake me up when this nightmare is over, can't we just skip 2020. Or maybe better yet-CANCEL it! Thoughts from Pastor Amanda

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. I miss worshiping in person with you in the sanctuary and Luther Hall. I am thankful for the ways we continue to be **Gustavus Adolphus Lutheran Church** together. And, I look forward to this new year and the hopefulness of gathering for small groups, fellowship, and worship within our facility as vaccinations become more available. You continue to be in my prayers during this pandemic and I hope that you are staying well and tending to your spiritual, mental, emotional and physical health during this time of increased social isolation. God has and will see us through this time in our lives and history, just as God sustained and abided with God's people in the past. Normally I use this column in January to look forward to a new year together. And I am looking forward to a new year with our congregation and wider community (please check out worship and faith formation activities). However, I write this article from a profound place of sadness and I must acknowledge it rather than moving too quickly to hopes, dreams and plans. This winter has seen my family affected by Covid and grief. My mother and sister have been ill with Covid. Thankfully they are improving. My sister has even returned to work at her nursing home as she tends to the residents of her assigned unit. My mom continues to deal with ongoing symptoms from Covid yet has survived the initial, immediate threat. I'm grateful for all of that. And yet my heart is sad . . . sad for many griefs . . . my cousin Mark who is on a ventilator at the hospital and at death's door from acute liver failure due to unknown reasons (he was ill with Covid this fall and has been weak since then) . . . the death of another beloved member of our congregation, Barb Josephson, and the inability to gather with her family at her bedside in the

final moments of her life and to gather as a congregation to remember her and celebrate her life . . . the many members of our community who are alone this season, whether at home to stay safe from Covid or at a hospital or nursing home and not able to see loved ones . . . the little things, like the cancellation of the Holidazzle celebration or the closure of the museums which means no visit for my kids to the Swedish Institute's Santa Claus. . . the long lines of folks receiving boxes of food from Merrick Food Shelf, which is great because they're receiving food they need, and yet makes me sad because who are we as a society that so many people have this need in the first place the list could go on and on.

Normally I abide in the light of hope. I am a very optimistic person. If you look up optimist in the dictionary my picture may even be there. I am also aware that I have a tendency to move forward without naming grief. In my very Scandinavian ancestral way, I put aside grief for what needs to be done and remind myself of the good I know.

Yet grief and darkness is part of who we are as Christians. As Ecclesiastes reminds us there is a time to mourn and a time to rejoice. We cannot have the light without the darkness. Most importantly, God dwells in the darkness and the light, reaching us where we are.

So, dear friends in Christ, what have you been grieving this winter? What is the darkness you are abiding or walking among? How is God dwelling with you in the muck?

The gifts of Christmas are plentiful. For me, this Christmas season, the most precious gift is the reminder that Emmanuel God shows up in the muck and mess of human living and fragility with our tender hopes and raw grief. May God be with you. and, merry Christmas.




Women's Book Club


